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

New Chair elected

Earlier this year, Jim Breeds, our Chair of the past few years, stood down due to health and time issues. During his time in the position, Jim was very active and contributed enormously to the progress of the Trust and its work. We're sure that all members would like to join the Trustees in thanking Jim and wishing him well in the future.

At the last meeting of the OCLT trustees, Peter Chowney was elected as the new Chair of the trust. Peter is a former leader of Hastings Borough Council. He served as the councillor for Tressell Ward from 2016 until last May, when he retired as a



Peter said: " From the time I was first elected as a councillor for Tressell Ward, I was determined to get the

woodland designated as protected open space, to make sure this valuable public resource could not be built on. I'm very pleased I was able to play a part in achieving that. When I stood down as a councillor, I volunteered to be a trustee of OCLT, and am now pleased to have been elected as Chair of the trust. I will use my knowledge of the area, and my contacts on the council to do all I can to maintain Speckled Wood as a public open space, and to promote access to it for local people to enjoy. As much of the land is in private ownership, we cannot however be complacent. There are still pressures from the landowners to develop the land, so we must be vigilant and ensure that doesn't happen. With the help of our vol-

unteers, we can keep the woodland as an accessible and valuable resource for local people, as well as a natural space to enhance biodiversity in an urban environment."

Construction of the new bridge at the Victoria Avenue end of the Speckled Wood stream (Bridge 5) was carried out in September by our team of volunteers. This replaced the previous bridge that was broken by vandals earlier in the year and is made of railway sleepers. It was a more difficult task than the other bridges due to the wider gap between the stream banks and the distance that the very heavy sleepers had to be moved but the expertise of the volunteers and the use of a heavy duty trolley made the task achievable.



Progress with the eradication of Japanese Knotweed

We have finally had significant success with our programme of treating the Knotweed that was covering our



land next to Church Street. Most of the previous growth has not returned this year, leaving only a small area to treat in September as shown in the photo. We plan to clear this large area of land of the remaining rubble and weeds next year and plant grass with meadow flowers and some trees.

However the knotweed growing beside the steam along the valley floor, which is not on our land, will be a much more difficult task to deal with.





Forest School

With thanks to Big Local North East Hastings, our Parent and Child Forest School sessions have been able to continue for free this term. Local families from the TN34 and 35 areas have been attending the sessions each week in the Community Garden. They have been learning and engaging in nature, trying out new skills and cooking delicious food on the camp fire.
