Tool Store in Church Street Broken into and Power Tools Stolen



Clearance of Blocked Stream Culvert under Frederick Road

At long last and after continuous pressure from County Councillor, Julia Hilton, East Sussex County Council have finally agreed to commission the work to clear this blocked Culvert in mid to late May. The effect of the blockage caused by branches, debris and silt washed

> down by the stream over a number of years has resulted in the footpath and area being regularly flooded.

> In addition Ore Community Land Trust arranged for the Conservation Volunteers (TCV) to construct a number of 'leaky dams' upstream from the culvert to try to stop future blockages at the culvert entrance.

News from the Chair - Peter Chowney

As a volunteer at Great Dixter garden, I've been keen to involve them in what we're doing in Speckled Wood. I already knew Fergus Garrett, the Dixter CEO and Head Gardner (and international horticultural celebrity) before I started volunteering there. So I knew that he had an interest in getting involved in projects that would benefit the more deprived parts of Hastings.



Earlier this year, we arranged for Fergus and other gardeners from Great Dixter to visit Speckled Wood. They were all impressed with that they saw, recognising it as

something of a woodland oasis in an urban part of Hastings. From this, we've been able to establish several tentative collaborations, including a woodland management plan to be carried out by the specialist who did the management plan for the Dixter estate woodlands, and a supply of plants, for the community garden.



One of the Dixter gardeners, who is a keen forager, also noted that the woodland is rich in 'food for free', with many edible plants, particularly in the areas where knotweed has been cleared. He even commented on how the clay subsoil that has been dumped there, from building operations in Greville Road, is of a very good quality, and could be used for pottery. So he has offered to do some foraging courses in the woodland, and perhaps even pottery making, if we could build a kiln!

We also took Fergus to visit the Ore Valley greenspace, the protected open space in the lower Ore Valley, along the railway line and around the adventure playground. This is owned by SeaSpace, a residual local regeneration company, and needs to be transferred to a local community trust for the purposes of managing the land for public access in the future. Fergus noted that the variety of trees on the land was considerably more diverse than in Speckled Wood. There is also potential funding attached to this land, including possible projects being developed as part of the Shared Prosperity Fund, to be focussed on community health and well-being around the Broomgrove Estate. Ore Community Land Trust would be keen to take on that land, and Fergus was keen to get Great Dixter involved too, should that come to pass.

However, the transfer of the land from SeaSpace has been in the pipeline for several years now ... hopefully some of the funding opportunities now available, and the potential involvement of Great Dixter, will make this finally happen.
