Would you like to join our volunteer team or come along to help when you have time? We run regular

volunteer sessions every **Thursday morning from 10.00 am** and also on the **morning of the 1**<sup>st</sup> **Saturday in the month**. Sessions start from our volunteer base, which is below the Green next to the Salvation Army Hall in Old London Road. Now that spring is here, we have a lot of varied work to tackle and volunteers can help with a range of tasks including – litter picking, clearing paths & the stream, dealing with fallen trees & branches, repairing steps, planting trees and work in our Community Garden.

We will be running volunteer training sessions, in April, on woodland work and use of tools and equipment, provided by experts from the Conservation Volunteers (TCV).

# **News from the Chair - Peter Chowney**



As well as our continuing work in Speckled Wood, with all the work contributed by volunteers helping us to keep this area of important local green space accessible, we have been looking at ways to acquire more land we could look after and maintain for local people to enjoy.

Much of the land in Speckled Wood is not owned by Ore Community Land Trust. We

have bought a couple of small parcels of land, and Hastings Council has transferred ownership of a

couple of others to the Trust. We are now looking to take on Ore Village Green, and the land immediately behind it, which is currently owned by the council. This land adjoins land we already own, where the Volunteer Centre is sited in the woodland. Owning this land would make it easier for us bring a water supply to the volunteer centre and community garden. But it would also mean that we would need to maintain it as a public amenity space, so we'll need more local volunteers to help with that.



However, we don't necessarily have to keep it as entirely mown grass. It could, for example, be a mixture of mown grass and wildflower meadow. We will be seeking the views of local people on how it should be maintained in the future. We'll be talking to experts at Great Dixter gardens about the best way to do this, to maintain its value as public open space, and to maximise biodiversity on the land. To start this conversation, we're very pleased to welcome Fergus Garrett, Head Gardener at Great Dixter, to our AGM on 20<sup>th</sup> April to kick off the discussion and contribute his ideas for what could be possible. I hope we'll see you there!

We are also talking to SeaSpace about acquiring the Lower Ore Valley greenspace. This land was set aside as protected green space as part of the Millennium Communities scheme that didn't quite happen. It was always intended to transfer it to a local trust, so we've offered to take it on. The Seaspace board has agreed that we should, so we're now just waiting for the interminable legal processes to complete. We'll be working with Great Dixter and the Conservation Volunteers organisation to develop plans for access and to promote biodiversity, when we get it.

### **Membership Renewal**

Membership runs from January to December, but you can still renew your membership for 2024. If you're not already a member, please join via our website. The more members we have, the louder our voice and more likely we will be to achieve our aims to ensure Speckled Wood remains accessible as open green space for all to enjoy.
